



We engage in independent study, share workshop information, present topical studies, share tidbits and resources, and offer critiques. We have grown far beyond where individual effort would have taken us.





The Elements of Design			
(the tools to make art)			
Line		Horizontal, vertical, diagonal, straight, curved, dotted, broken thick, thin.	
Shape	*	2D (two dimensional)/ flat Geometric (square, circle, oval, triangle) Organic (all other shapes)	
Form	5	3D (three dimensional), Geometric (cube, sphere, cone), Organic (all other forms such as: people, animals, tables, chairs, etc).	
Colour	*	Refers to the wavelengths of light. Refers to hue (name), value [lightness/darkness], intensity (naturation, or amount of pigment), and temperature (warm and cool). Relates to tint, tone and shade.	
Value	* **	The lightness or darkness of an image (or part of an image).	
Texture	*	The feel, appearance, thickness, or stickiness of a surface (for example: smooth, rough, silky, furry).	
Space		The area around, within, or between images or parts of an image (relates to perspective). Positive and negative space.	

How do you know when a painting is finished?

(how to use the tools to make art)		
Pattern	A regular arrangement of alternated or repeated elements (shapes, lines, colours) or motifs.	
Contrast 🛉 🛉	The juxtaposition of different elements of design (for example: rough and smooth testures, dark and light values) in order to highlight their differences and/or create visual interest, or a focal point.	
Emphasis	Special attention/importance given to one part of a work of art (for example, a dark shape in a light composition). Emphasis can be achieved through placement, contrast, colour, size, repetition Relates to focal point.	
Balance	A feeling of holonce results when the elements of design are arranged symmetrically or asymmetrically to create the impression of equality in weight or importance.	
Proportion/ Scale	The relationship between objects with respect to size, number, and so on, including the relation between parts of a whole.	
Harmony	The arrangement of elements to give the viewer the feeling that all the parts of the piece form a coherent whole.	
Rhythm/ Movement	The use of recurring elements to direct the movement of the sys- through the artearts. There are for high-a dirythms: random, replay, alternating, programmin, and diracing. The way the dissenses are organised to had the opt to the fixed area. Movement can be directed for example, since edges and by means of shape and colour.

When I first tried to read Jerry Saltz's <u>How to be</u> <u>an Artist</u>, I couldn't get in to it. It is written differently from most of what I read, and, I quickly realized I would need to be in a "thinking" mood to consume it. I actually picked it up several times, read a paragraph, and put it down again. But, I finally decided to struggle through. After all, I did buy it. So I have to read it!

<u>How to be an Artist</u> isn't your typical technique book. It, also, is not an art history book. (Though, it does have some of both, including plates of important art and exercises to improve your art.) This book is bite-sized and arranged as such. And, I think, purposely so. It could be read in a single sitting. But perhaps, it is best utilized as a primer to creative work over time, some thoughts to chew on through the day and to come back to for more. I found myself grinning and nodding to myself from time to time. On occasion, I put the book down to look up an artist (George W. Bush). Or, study an artist more closely (Cezanne, I knew I loved him but now I know why!). This tiny little book, that's hard to start, yet difficult to put down, is definitely worth the asking price... - submitted by Scarlett Fleming


